

MINUTES OF THE 136th MEETING OF THE COUNCIL OF THE BORO. OF CHESTER HEIGHTS HELD IN THE BORO. SCHOOL BUILDING MONDAY APRIL 7th 1958 at 8 P. M.

The meeting was called to order by President Townsend with all members present.

The minutes of the March meeting were approved as read.

The following receipts were reported and handed to the Treas;

Due to the absence of Miss Dickson the Treas. report was presented by the Secretary and was approved.

Reports of Committees;

Burgess, No Report.

Building Inspector; Mr. Voigt requested advise on the issuance of a permit for the erection of temporary shelters at the Walnut Hill produce stand, should such a request be received by him. Mr. Voigt was advised to handle this in accordance with the Boro. regulations.

Mr. Voigt requested permission to consult with the Boro. Solicitor regarding a letter which he planned to send to all Plumbers doing business within the Borough and the issuance of yearly Plumbing Permits covering such business.

Upon motion, which was seconded, it was unanimously approved that Mr. Voigt is hereby authorized to consult Mr. Cramp on this matter.

Mr. Voigt advised that the neighbors of the shop on the Groff property were being annoyed by noise and lights due to the operation of this business at night. This was referred to the Burgess for investigation.

Highway Committee;

Mr. Hobough advised that he would contact the Penna. Highway Dept. regarding repairs to the Boro. roads.

President Townsend appointed the following as members of the Committee on the Revision of the Building Code;

Chairman, Mr. Wood, Mr. Anderson, Mr. Ward and Mr. Voigt.

Mr. Theo. Buckley related his experinces with Officials of the Phila. Electric Company on the restoration of electric service in the Borough after the snowstorm of March 19-20th. This Borough was without electric service from four to six days because of the great damage to the power lines, which in Mr. Buckley's opinion are in most cases obsolete and should be replaced with modern and up-to date equipment.

It was then moved and seconded and unanimously approved that the Secretary should communicate with the Phila. Electric Company requesting the installation of substantial and modern electric service in the Borough.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.
